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Introduction and Background

MenEngage Africa (MEA), in collaboration with Save the Children International (SCI), Frontline AIDS, Y+ Global and other partners is planning to host a three-day SRHR (Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights) Learning and Exchange Symposium, aimed at fostering collaboration, knowledge sharing, and action towards strengthening comprehensive sexuality education, safe abortion, and youth-friendly health services. The engagement aligns with the strategic plan outlined in the [MEA SRHR Strategic Plan \(2023-2027\)](#) and focuses on the LINK, LEARN, IMPROVE, and INFLUENCE strategies, as well as the Youth Participation and Youth Leadership initiatives that describe the major thrust of other international partners such as SCI, UNESCO, UNAIDS etc programming direction.

Sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) are essential for human well-being and constitute an integral part of human development, gender equality, and social development, but there are still many challenges in Africa. Access to comprehensive sexuality education, safe abortion, HIV prevention and treatment and youth-friendly services is limited, especially for marginalized populations. Sub-Saharan Africa has the highest pregnancy rate and unintended pregnancy rate in the world, with 77% of abortions being unsafe. This leads to high rates of maternal death and hospitalization. Only 37% of young people in sub-Saharan Africa have comprehensive knowledge about HIV prevention and transmission, and early marriage and unintended pregnancy are global concerns for girls' health and education. These issues hinder efforts to address high rates of teenage pregnancy, STIs, and gender-based violence.

Comprehensive sexuality education (CSE) in Africa is crucial for promoting the sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) of individuals, particularly young people. CSE equips individuals with knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary to make informed decisions, navigate relationships, and protect themselves from sexual and gender-based violence and diseases. Moreover, CSE plays a pivotal role in preventing the spread of HIV and destigmatizing conversations around sexual health, fostering a more inclusive and informed society. CSE programs in Africa are age-appropriate, tailored to the developmental stages of learners, and address topics such as puberty, relationships, consent, contraceptive methods, STIs, gender roles, and sexual rights. CSE takes a holistic approach, encompassing biological, psychological, social, and cultural aspects of sexuality and goes beyond mere provision of information, encouraging critical thinking, communication skills, and values clarification.

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several socio ecological factors contribute to adolescents and young people's mental health concerns, interpersonal violence, poverty and lack of educational and economic opportunity, and substance abuse (Hill et al., 2019). The concepts, sexual orientation, gender identity, and intersex are linked by common issues of safety and promoting and protecting sexual health. Therefore, it is a priority to promote human rights in order to condemn abuses related to sexual orientation or gender identity and to protect and provide supportive services for LGBTQ youth.

Gender-based violence (GBV) is a deeply entrenched and pervasive issue in Africa, affecting millions of individuals, with women and girls being disproportionately impacted. GBV intersects with Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) in multifaceted ways, creating complex challenges that undermine individuals' sexual and reproductive well-being. Survivors of GBV may face significant reproductive health consequences, including unintended pregnancies resulting from sexual violence. Limited access to safe abortion services and supportive resources further exacerbates the challenges faced by survivors. Addressing GBV is a fundamental prerequisite for advancing SRHR and promoting gender equality in Africa. Comprehensive sexuality education plays a crucial role in preventing GBV, encompassing discussions about consent, healthy relationships, and the prevention of violence, while also addressing the intricate link between HIV and structural inequalities making people vulnerable to GBV/HIV transmission.

Rationale for the Symposium

The MenEngage Africa SRHR Learning and Exchange Engagement is an important event that brings together diverse stakeholders to address critical issues related to gender-based violence (GBV), comprehensive sexuality education, safe abortion, and access to sexual and reproductive health rights (SRHR) in Africa. - Develop actionable recommendations and strategies, including measures to Fight inequalities and structural drivers of GBV / HIV etc, for effective advocacy towards improved SRHR policies and programs, ensuring the rights and well-being of all individuals in Africa.
